When Henry VIII cut ties with the Church of Rome in order to marry Anne Boleyn, he unleashed a wave of religious reform that shook English society to its core. Targeting the perceived excesses of Rome, the Reformers demanded huge changes to the conduct of religious services including radical simplification of the music – no more Latin, only one note per syllable of text, no complicated polyphony.

The young Princess Elizabeth would have witnessed all of this religious and musical turmoil, including the brief restoration of Catholicism by her sister Mary. Although Elizabeth allowed the Reformers to eventually stamp out the "old" music and Catholicism in the provinces, she apparently secretly preferred the more elaborate polyphony and allowed its use to continue at least in the Chapel Royal. Even though her favourite court composers — Tallis and Byrd - were closet Catholics, she never sent them to the Tower!
